The Salford Spirit exhibition is an amalgamation of artwork centred around a cultural hub for the cities of Manchester and Salford. Salford has produced some seminal artists over its long history in many different vocations. Indeed, the father of the Northern Art movement himself was intrinsically tied to the area and ever associated with it. Laurence Stephen Lowry was and still is the cornerstone of North West art, his work continues to amaze and enthral visitors to the two main museums in the cities, the Manchester Art Gallery and the Salford Art Gallery and Museum. He is also one of the few British artists that has his own dedicated Museum, The Lowry in Salford Quays. A recent auction record for his famous 'Going to the Match' painting saw his popularity and importance rise even higher. There are several of our gallery artists who are massively influenced by his work, including Jerry Gordon, Lucy Manfredi and Jo Holdsworth, to name just a few.

Emma Rodgers has worked tirelessly to bring this exhibition to life and curate it to a very high standard. Emma's work centres around the third dimensional in bronze. Being always inspired by nature and animals and their connection to humans, it makes her public sculpture, Salford Firsts, the perfect fit for both her and the expansive history of the city. Her sculpture of Tony Wilson is a superb rendition of his character and spirit captured and immortalised in bronze. The hardest thing to capture in any sculpture of a person is their personality, and Emma has really caught Tony Wilson's in this wonderful bust.

Salford Firsts Unveiling

Bronze

Salford has a unique past and an exciting future. A city with rich history and significant world firsts. When creating this piece, Rodgers' main aim was to bring together and celebrate these firsts in one piece, offering an opportunity to discover, explore and reflect on Salford's fascinating and inspiring stories. This has long been a city that paved the way with a wealth of innovation, creativity and ideas that shaped the society we live in today.

The sculpture's focal point is the horse which has a long relationship with the city of Salford, working in the underground colliery and canal systems. Salford was the first city to have a horse drawn bus service and most significantly the horse is a physical representation of 'horse power'. He rests patiently by the lamp post: a bronzed representation of the first gas lit street lights, just a few steps away on Chapel Street. The name Salford derives from an Old English word meaning willows by the ford and this is symbolised by the entwined trees at the top of the lamp post.

Train tracks run along the bridle, weaving through the lamp post with canal systems and rope following Salford's industrial journey through time. From the base of the lamp post to the mane of the horse, books rest within the sculpture representing the first free public library in the United Kingdom. Each book features a story of this great city.

Peter 'Hooky' Hook from 'Joy Division', later reforming as 'New Order', had "Salford Rules" on his speaker caps, which features in the sculpture. Hook says, "I think Salford people have a stoicism, a way of using humour to get through life with all it's pitfalls. It's a heritage that I'm very proud of... It was actually nice to be able to sit down and discuss what was going to be on it, and very flattered to think that I made it, I really am flattered! Emma, in particular, was very encouraging... We've got a lot to celebrate, and this I think, and I'm hoping, will be one of those things that sparks people's imagination".

Rodgers, Hook, and the ceremonial mayor of Salford unveiled the sculpture on 8th September 2021. Salford Firsts resides outside the old town hall in Bexley Square, Chapel Street, Salford.



Many of his drawings and paintings depict Pendlebury, Salford where he lived and worked for over 40 years. He painted the view of Trinity Church and The Flat Iron from Chapel Street in 1925 and this is now one of the only views of the city that has remained unchanged.

Harold Riley was born in 1934 in Salford and attended Salford Grammar School and won a scholarship in 1951 to attend the Slade School of Fine Art, University College, London.

Riley sold his first painting to the Salford Museum and Art Gallery when he was 11 years old. He believes his main work is to document the city and his life cycle in Salford, through painting and photography. The deep affection for his home town cemented a friendship with L.S. Lowry which began when Riley was his student.



Tony Wilson

Factory Records was founded by Tony Wilson and Alan Erasmus in 1978 and was a Manchester based British independent record label boasting artists such as Happy Mondays, Joy Division and James.

Anthony Howard Wilson was born on 20th February 1950 in Pendleton, Salford. Better known as 'Tony' Wilson, he was a record label owner; radio and TV presenter; nightclub manager; and a journalist for Granada and BBC. He was behind some of Manchester's most successful bands; one of the founders of Factory Records; founder and manager of The Hacienda.



"The original bust is mainly constructed of broken records by bands Tony had worked with, the surfaces and edges provide interesting textures to the sculpture, his glasses are not fully formed, like a loose sketch and perch low on his nose, like they did when he was in deep conversation. I have studied a number of images, information and video footage to watch his expression and movement hence his hand resting gently on his shirt.

Loose text of quotes and information are interwoven through the piece, to enhance the narrative. Even the base gives a gentle nod to an OMD album cover. My aim was to keep the piece quite fluid as he was so expressive with such an imagination. A really forward thinking person I was trying to convey that energy of such a strong character."






